

PRAYER POTENTIAL & POWER

Every Christian I know believes in prayer.

Every Christian I know would like to pray more effectively.

Every Christian I know wants to pray more often.

How then, can we increase our prayer potential and power?

Here are a few suggestions:

- 1) Set aside a time, and choose a special place for daily prayer. Morning is ideal because it creates an attitude of prayer for the day.
- 2) Keep reminders of items that need prayer. IATW sends a monthly prayer newsletter about the 15th of every month, and a prayer bulletin insert is sent out for the beginning of the month. Keep these with your Bible and devotional materials. When you come to prayer the reminders are right there with you. (Available on line at www@iatw.ca)
- 3) The Bible has many suggestions and commands for what we should pray and how we should pray. Incorporate these into your prayer time. Pray for labourers, (Matthew 9:38) and open doors, (Colossians 4:3) that the Gospel may go forth speedily. (2 Thessalonians. 3:1) Pray that the Gospel will be proclaimed clearly (Colossians 4:4) and that when we open our mouths, our lips will be anointed to make plain the mystery of the Gospel. (Ephesians 6:19)
- 4) Incorporate a time of listening into prayer time. What is the Spirit saying? What is the Spirit prompting us to pray or to do?
- 5) Share with others the answers to prayer. This will encourage them to be part of the prayer attack that the kingdom of God will mount against the powers of darkness.
- 6) Pick at least one unreached tribe to pray for. Research them and get prayer information. We work with various tribes that could be chosen such as: Afar, Beja, Nara, Saho, Vemgo, Fulani, and Swahili.



SPECIAL PRAYER FOCUS: Ramadan, the month of September 24 – October 23, is fasting and prayer for Muslims. Pray that the power of God will totally tear down the walls of Islam and bring many millions to the light of Christ; that God will give them visions of Jesus as the Son of God and Saviour.

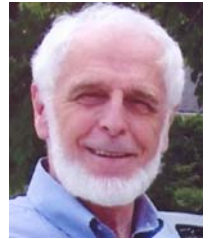
Swimming and visiting was followed by a delicious supper. We ended the evening with a time of 'missionary stories' around a campfire.

KENYA -Jim Farquharson . In July Jim visited the two clinics he has started in the Kenya slums. One of the main problems in Kenya is the HIV virus. Jim has started these people on a regimen of selenium. He met with many of these people on his recent trip and was pleased with the initial results. He writes: "I could not help but reflect on the impact that God has allowed us to make in these lives to date and marvel at His inclusion of humans into his plan. The pastors in Kenya have been trying to find a way to reach Muslims for Christ and repeatedly told me that they believe our programme is God's answer to their prayers. IU delighted to sit in consultation with the Muslim women that have come to the clinics and they come freely despite the fact that several of the clinics are in the churches in the slums.



KENYA: Orma tribe – We share in prayer and support of Anne and Julia who work amongst the unreached Orma tribe. They report in the last year about 5 young people have accepted Christ. This leads to persecution. Pray for Anne and Julia as they continue to live in difficult circumstances. Pray for the young people to grow in their faith and be effective witnesses for Christ.

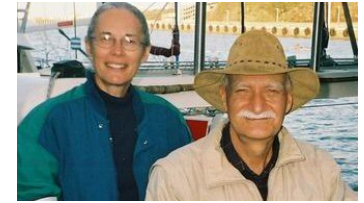
ARMS OF LOVE CHILDRENS HOME: Leigh Ross returned to Kenya, ending her time of recuperation in the States, to care for the children at the orphanage. While Leigh was away their chief worker, Bancy, was brutally attacked in the presence of the orphans, sexually assaulted, and then left unconscious in a pool of blood. The children, who were obviously traumatized by the event, were taken to "Kings Kids", a nearby home. We praise God that Bancy has come out of her coma and is recuperating, and that Leigh was able to return to "Arms of Love" to care for the children. Pray that Satan will have no power over the children because of this event, and that God will be glorified.

WESTERN KENYA: Adriano Simiyu continues to reach out to villages to plant churches. He works mainly in rural Kenya but recently has started a Nairobi branch as many of their people have moved to the city.

RACHEL STICKLEE – reports things are going well at the ladies crafts co-op. She has found some new designs and new products she has introduced and the ladies are working on their production. She also has a few new outlets for sales. Pray for wisdom as she initiates new programs. Her plans for the fall include two months at home in Canada doing deputation and further training and equipping for future ministry.



SOUTH AFRICA: One of the problems the lack of men interested in the Gospel. For over two years they have been praying and working to break down the barriers. Gene was both shocked and blessed recently when young men came to him and said "We want to accept Jesus." With joy he shared more of the gospel with them and led them to repentance and a prayer for salvation.

Imagine their delight and surprise the next day when another young man came to them upset that he had missed out! He was not able to come the day before – and also wanted Jesus as His Saviour. Gene and Janice are encouraged by the boys' positive response as they are being discipled and prepared for baptism. Another man recently came to Gene and shared deep feelings of sinfulness. Gene writes "We will need prayer to know how to share with him not going too fast and letting the Holy Spirit do a deep work." Please continue praying for their outreach to the men.

Gene and Janice also ask prayer for their government paper work. They will soon need to renew their visa and get a different class. Ask God to help them get their paper work without problems.

BELIZE: We are saddened by John and Anne Scharman's request to resign from ministry in Belize. John has withdrawn from the work and is seeking other ways to make a living. Pray that God will bring healing and hope in a difficult situation.

Greg and Deb Renton continue to work in Belize. They request prayer for the sale of their motel in Saint John, New Brunswick. Once the motel sells they want to spend their time in missions mobilization. They have outreach possibilities with a High School in Guyana on Caye Caulker.

KENYA: Lynette Ondiko, of Haven of Peace women's ministries, has started a second chapter of the ministry in Kisumu. Lynette has been hospitalized for some medical problems, but she is improving. Pray for her as she ministers to abused and hurting women. She is also returning to school to get further education to help her minister to neglected and abused women and children. in the ministry to these neglected hurting women. We assist her financially in this work as we are able.



DON AND CHRISTINA HANNAFORD are considering a return ministry trip to Kenya. Pray with them for the right timing and funding. You can financially support them through the use of the Op-Action sheet.

INDIA: Hallelujah Israel shared the differences between life in urban and rural India. The village people are held back and suffer from many problems, including lack of education. The Church is seeking to alleviate these as well as bring them to new life in Christ.

The recent elections have been a blessing. The previous Hindu party had introduced anti-conversion laws, but the new party is allowing conversion again, opening the door to preach the Gospel. Pray that this freedom will continue; since it is a coalition government no-one knows how long they will be in power.

One of our most urgent needs right now is finances to finish the classrooms at the High School. The government recently gave us permission to expand the school to grade 12. To we need more classrooms and a larger library. Secondly the government has asked us to replace all temporary church structures with permanent cement structures. Pray that these needs will be met and that God will be honoured through this ministry.



Ian and Lynne White are working on plans to return to Kenya later this year. They will be opening the new Rehema house for abandoned children – hopefully by Christmas. Lynne had surgery recently and is recovering. Ian is constructing a mission house in Brandon, the sale of which will provide funds for the new children’s home.

Pray for churches and individuals to stand with them in this much needed ministry to widows and orphans.



Ken Riegert is recovering well from typhoid. He has tested ‘clear’ but continues to struggle with fatigue. Pray for a full recovery. Nancy’s joint pain has improved and is doing quite well even in the cooler summer weather. In July they had a few weeks house sitting another missionaries home in a warmer climate.



Jonathon Eby is in New Brunswick at Arrowhead Native Bible camp (ANBC). When he returns from camp he will finalize his visa application and order his tickets to South Africa where he will work with Gene and Janice Weatherby. Pray that his camp experience will be a highlight and that his final preparations, including fundraising, will go well.

WEST AFRICA – NIGERIA

Bitrus Audu reports... The new outreach to the Vemgo tribe is going from strength to strength. They completed the building and we put the roof on.

(Below) They have a new pastor Yunana Billy who



will be with them for at least a year. They would like help to establish a primary school and a dispensary.

Four people graduated last December, bringing the total number of graduates to fifteen. Until recently the diploma program has only been in English, but this last quarter we started offering courses in the Hausa language. We also started a Bible literacy class last quarter and had 5 enrolled to take the course. The school building is not quite finished but it is usable.



CAMEROON: The four evangelists supported by Into all The World started 3 new churches in the last three months. The converts are mainly immigrants from Chad who have come to Cameroon looking for work. Cameroon is, as Jesus said, a matter of a ripe harvest with few labourers. The indigenous Fulani people need much prayer. We have men available to work there but the support is \$67.00 a month.

CHAD: We have appointed Isa Bango as our co-ordinator. It is the rainy season in Chad and travel is very difficult; roads are not all-weather friendly. This makes for poor communication at best.

BENIN: Our lead pastor is Richard Okorie. They have adopted the celebration approach to evangelism. This helps them reach adults and children through music concerts, and thanksgiving services. The biggest cost for them currently is the monthly rental for the hall for meetings. Funds from Canada help meet this need of \$250 a month.



NEW MEDICAL OUTREACH: Sister Grace Uchola joined us about a year ago. She is a nurse. She combines women and children’s work with medical work. She has had much success amongst the Higgi people in Gra village.
